lodged it to do so without delay-an action which the BMA considers deplorable.

"At its meeting the CCHMS learned from the Hospital Consultants and Specialists Association (of which Dr Lawlor is a member) that it had received a letter from Mr Ennals which stated:

'I understand that Dr Lawlor has been offered alternative employment as a consultant in the region and this demonstrates that there is no question of his competence being impugned before the inquiry is held'."

In a letter (dated 23 September) to the Secretary of State seeking a Section 70 inquiry Dr Gullick said:

'We have a situation in which a senior and experienced consultant has been suspended from his appointment by an employing authority which has no reason whatever to doubt his competence in the carrying out of his duties. Of even greater public importance is the fact that Dr Lawlor's suspension, we understand, and the industrial action which precipitated his suspension, followed upon his very proper request that certain unexplained instances of injury sustained by mentally retarded patients should be the subject of an inquiry.'

New professor of medical microbiology at Birmingham

Dr Henry Samuel Bedson has been appointed to the chair and headship of the department of virology, renamed medical microbiology,



at the University of Birmingham, in succession to Professor Peter Wildy. Dr Bedson, who is 47, graduated from the London Hospital Medical College. After National Service with the RAMC he spent six years in the department of bacteriology at the University of Liverpool, moving

to Birmingham as senior lecturer in 1964, later being promoted to reader in virology. Dr Bedson's laboratory is one of several collaborating with the WHO Reference Laboratories in the evaluation of poxviruses now being isolated in smallpox-free areas. He is a member of the WHO Informal Group on Monkeypox and Related Poxviruses and of the Dangerous Pathogens Advisory Group set up by the DHSS.

Life in Lister's wards

Polycystic ovary syndrome

In the article by Drs Jean Ginsburg and C W H Havard (25 September, p 737) we regret that a printing error occurred at the end of the third paragraph. It should read as follows: "The exact prevalence of the disorder is difficult to assess. In a series of 160 abdominal operations where the ovaries were examined routinely polycystic changes were found in 12 cases, which is a prevalence of 7.5%; a prevalence of 3.5% was found in a necropsy series.⁴ The prevalence of polycystic ovarian change in patients attending an endocrine clinic is in our experience, however, much higher—about 17%.5"
