THE WORSHIPFUL SOCIETY OF APOTHECARIES IN LONDON

THE APOTHECARIES SOCIETY was formed in December 1617 when they received their first Charter from King James the First and became a "Body Corporate of good and true men skilled in the Art and Mystery of an Apothecary".

On August 17th 1964 Sir Arthur Porritt was installed as Master of the Company, Mr. Richard Alan Brews as Senior Warden and Mr. Harold Edwards as Junior Warden. These three persons constitute the Private Court of the Society. The full court consists of:
