A 4-year-old boy presented with an 8-day history of low-grade fever and diffuse, progressive skin lesions on the face, arms, legs, and buttocks. His trunk, palms, and soles were spared. The lesions were discrete, mild, pruritic, erythematous, monomorphic papules. The patient had suffered an upper respiratory tract infection 2 weeks before.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Hand, foot, and mouth disease
2. Pityriasis rosea
3. Molluscum contagiosum
4. Gianotti-Crosti syndrome
5. Scabies

A 44-year-old white female patient presented with painful erosions and flaccid bullae scattered on her trunk, affecting oral and genital mucosae. She took occasional nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs for headaches, and was otherwise healthy.

The most likely diagnosis is

1. Second-degree burn
2. Bullous impetigo
3. Pemphigus vulgaris
4. Bullous pemphigoid
5. Bullous tinea

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
