pondent changes, which these substances experience in their chemical action upon light.

6th. The evanescence, or, as it is frequently termed, the absorption of light, is owing to the complete resolution of the compound into its conflituent parts.

ANSWER to the first Query:

The inoculated cow-pox, taking the refult of a great number of cafes, appears to me, to be a difeafe as much milder than the inoculated fmall-pox, as that difeafe is milder than the cafual fmall-pox.

To the 2d. I have used a variety of means to discover whether the cow-pox could be communicated by effluvia, but ineffectually.

To the 3d. A perfon on whom the vaccine pufule has been excited by *perfect* matter, and which has *completely* gone through the progreflive ftages of inflammation, maturation, and fcabbing, is ever after fecure from the fmall-pox.

To the 4th. I have feen pimples excited by the cow-pox, with fometimes a little fluid at their apex; and, in two inftances, a vaccine puftule, refembling that on the arm produced by inoculation; but in no inftance, a fmall-pox-like puftule.

To the 5th. The vaccine difeafe does not appear to make the leaft imprefition on the conflictution unfavourable to health; on the contrary, in a great number of inflances, effecially among children, in whom the fcrophulous diathefis has evidently been

been exifting, its beneficial confequences have very foon been manifested.

To the 6th. No peculiar difeases have been noticed among those who have undergone the cow-pox at distant periods of their lives.

The 7th and 8th. Answered already.

To Dr. BRADLEY.

SIR,

AS an old fellow-fludent, I take the liberty of applying to to you to fend me fome of the matter of cow-pox, which I find by your useful Journal, has been conveyed to different parts in letters. I have made many inquiries in this neighbourhood to procure it; but as the complaint has not appeared lately among the dairies, I have not been fortunate enough to meet it. I find, however, that the country people are well acquainted with the difeafe, and defcribed it very accurately to me. It is known by the Irifh name of (Shinagh). They have long attributed to it the anti-variolous power, which renders it fo important a difcovery to the happiness of mankind. I met with two people, who had been themfelves affected with the complaint. A lady fhewed me the mark of it in one of her hands. She had it about forty years fince, and was then informed by fome of her neighbours that the never would have the fmall-pox; but gave little credit to their affertions. She has, however, been fince frequently exposed to the infection, and in confequence of her incredulity received feveral frights, particularly during the illnefs of her children, who had the fmall-pox rather heavily; but though fhe attended them very closely through the whole of their complaint, fhe did not take it herfelf. The other perfon is a gardener, who lives with a country gentleman of my acquaintance. He gave himfelf the cow-pox purpofely by rubbing himfelf against fome perfon who was affected with it, from a conviction that it would prevent the fmall-pox. This happened feveral years ago; and though he has often put himfelf in the way of the fmall-pox infection, and even lain in the fame bed with his children when they were covered with it, he has not taken the difeafe. If I had time to make the neceffary inquiries, I am fure I could multiply inftances of this kind, as I heard of many others who had the cow-pox, and escaped the small-pox in the same manner. But as I faw and converfed with these two, who are people of undoubted Ttt 2
