## Life sciences study design

Sample size

For experimental data sample size comprised 6 vestibular afferent. This provided 5 afferent recordings at the maximum safe pulse amplitude and 4 afferent recordings at eighteen pulse amplitudes from 25% to 100% of the safe pulse amplitude range for that electrode position with 4-5 repetition of each pulse rate-pulse amplitude combination. For the simulations, all 44 pulse amplitude trials for the range of pulse rates were tests with 7 afferents with different spontaneous rates and 10 different seeds.

Data exclusions

Neurons were excluded if the isolation was lost before the end of the protocol or the noise level was found to mask action potential detection in off-line analyses. This eliminated two of the original 8 afferents in the recording set. N/A for simulations.

All neurons were recorded from independently and were characterized using standard methods. Within the code replicability is shown across neuron parameters and randomized seeds.
