Trust	Cultural	Many professionals described that trust in each other's working methods, having an open attitude towards each other, and being able to talk openly about all kinds of subjects, positively affect cross-sectoral collaborations.
Common language	Cultural	Understanding what professionals from other sectors are talking about can be challenging. Creating a common language or learning how to understand each other's language is an

		important prerequisite for cross-sectoral collaborations.
Support base	Structural	When collaborating across sectors, it is important that there is a strong support base in every sector, preferably at every organizational level (politics, management, and execution). To create such a support base, it is essential that all involved professionals have the same sense of urgency.
Money	Structural	Shared finances can help to organize care more efficiently. Additionally, financial support can enable the funding of necessary collaboration structures, platforms, and communication.
