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Concerns Expressed in Gallup Survey Don't Apply to HMOs—Large Group Practice Survey Needed

Thanks for the very interesting survey of African-American physicians in the April 2004 issue (*J Natl Med Assoc.* 2004;96:419–433). As a physician working in Kaiser, I have to note that many of the concerns expressed in that survey do not

apply to HMOs, such as Kaiser, where malpractice is paid for the physician and reimbursements do not have to be negotiated with various insurance companies. On the other hand, a whole new set of problems arise that are not well-addressed by the survey, since it did not separate the responses of physicians in HMOs from those of physicians in solo practice or small group practice. Having seen a huge exodus of primary care African-American physicians from my facility over the past decade due to difficulties working in a large corporation, I would be happy to see a survey of physicians in large group practices to see what their concerns are.
