Title: Standardized statement regarding PrEP

Description: Excerpt script regarding PrEP given to participants during the interview; part of the interview guide.

- PrEP stands for "pre-exposure prophylaxis," an HIV prevention strategy that involves taking one pill a day of the antiretroviral drug Truvada, along with the regular use of condoms during sex.
- One recent clinical trial the iPrEX study followed nearly 2500 men who have sex with men and transgender women in six countries and found that the group who received PrEP was 44% less likely to become infected with HIV.
- iPrEX also found PrEP recipients experienced few side effects in taking the drug.
- Given the iPrEX results, it is likely that PrEP will soon become more available to gay/bi
 men and trans women, either through community clinics like City Clinic in San Francisco
 or through one's personal primary care doctor.
- If a person is interested in taking PrEP, he/she will be asked to take Truvada every day, as well as use condoms during sex. Also, he/she will need to have regular follow-up visits with their doctor at least once every three months, which will include getting tested for HIV and monitoring any potential drug side effects.
