| Context in which smoking or drinking occurs                        | 12 (31.6)            | "If it's people standing around at a cocktail party with a glass of champagne, I don't think they'll be too concerned about it. If it's a frat party with a funnel going on, I may be a little concerned. What is the situation? Are they at a wine tasting? Then I'd say, well, I guess that kind of fits the movie."  "If there's drinking games and, you know, it's college frat parties, that's not something yo |
|  |                      | want a 13-year-old to be watching. But if people are sitting around having a couple of glasses of wine or a couple of beers, that's not enough to deter me from the movie."  "Smoking an occasional cigarette is, in my opinion, not a big deal in a movie. But someor who's sitting there smoking pack after pack after pack, that's ridiculous."   |

| Smoking or drinking in youth-rated movies                          | 7 (18.4)             | "I don't like their smoking in all of their PG-13 movies. That's an irritant for me. It's in most of the movies that are supposedly PG/PG-13."   |
