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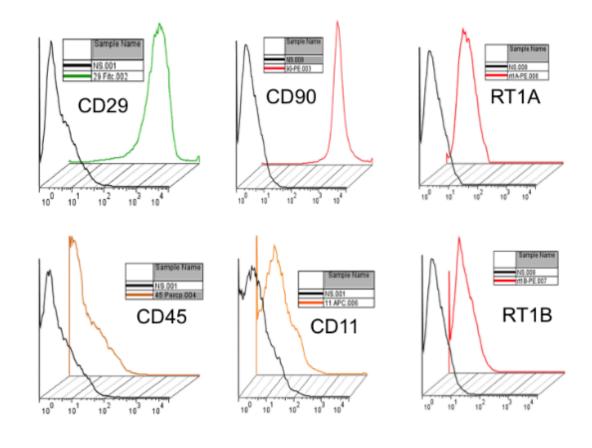

Supporting Figure 1. BM-MSC characterization. BM-MSCs consistently and homogenously expressed cell surface markers CD29 and CD90 and were negative for CD45, CD11, RT1A and RT1B as determined by flow cytometry analysis using fluorescent labeled monoclonal antibodies.

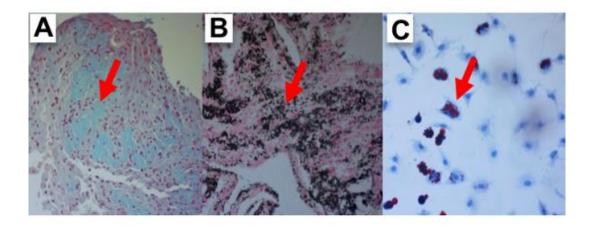
