The outputs in the paper are model-based and so standard statistical sample size calculations do not apply. However, we have highlighted here where we justify simulation assumptions.

For all simulations carried out, 10 simulation repeats were carried with substantial population sizes equal to 100,000 (page 20). These values were considered acceptable, yielding suitably small variation when examining gradual parameter sweeps, such as in in Figure 2 (page 5) and Figure 4 – supplement 2.

Replicates

For all simulations carried out, 10 simulation repeats were carried with substantial population sizes equal to 100,000 (page 20). These represent stochastic uncertainty, which at this population size is quite small. No simulations were rejected in analysis, with the population size being significantly large such that stochastic extinction did not occur.

Statistical reporting

- Statistical analysis methods should be described and justified
- Raw data should be presented in figures whenever informative to do so (typically when N per group is less than 10)
- For each experiment, you should identify the statistical tests used, exact values of N, definitions of center, methods of multiple test correction, and dispersion and precision measures (e.g., mean, median, SD, SEM, confidence intervals; and, for the major substantive results, a measure of effect size (e.g., Pearson's r, Cohen's d)

The paper contains simulation modelling output and as such no formal statistical hypothesis tests were conducted. The model was calibrated to the DRC data using a least-squares approach (page 7 Figure 3, and page 20). As this is not a full formal fitting method, uncertainty intervals for the estimated parameter are not appropriate to report.
