

Supplemental Fig. 2 Anxious behaviors do not correlate with occurrence of PTSD-like
phenotypes.

(A) Anxiety levels of stressed mice do not correlate with PTSD-like behaviors. Neither the amount of time that stressed mice spent in the open arms of the EPM (top left, Pearson correlations, R = -0.03426) nor the number of entries that stressed mice made into open arms (bottom left, R = -0.01298) correlated with the fear generalization indices.
