eMethods.

In Arkansas, all abortion facilities provided data on Texas residents obtaining abortions for both 2017 and 2020. In Colorado, 9 facilities provided data in 2017 and 14 provided data in 2020. In Kansas, data were not collected directly from facilities on Texas residents obtaining abortions in 2017. According to Kansas vital statistics reports, 22 Texas residents obtained an abortion in Kansas in calendar year 2017. See https://www.kdheks.gov/phi/abortion_sum/2017_Preliminary_Abortion_Report.pdf. All Kansas facilities provided data in 2020. In Louisiana and Oklahoma, data on Texas residents obtaining abortions in 2017 were obtained from state health departments. In 2020, 2 of 3 open facilities in Oklahoma and all facilities in Louisiana provided data on Texas residents. In New Mexico, 3 facilities provided data in 2017 and 4 provided data in 2020.
