In the Netherlands, patients usually visit their nurses every 3 months, under the supervision of a physician [3]. Therefore, these nurses were considered to be in an ideal position to recruit patients for this trial. Nationwide, nurses were approached via email, telephone calls, letters to their work address, and social media platforms (eg, LinkedIn and Facebook). They could sign up for the study by contacting the research team directly or by registering via the project website. Nurses were asked to recruit at least eight patients within a period of 6 months.
