^a FFCWS provides two versions of scorings (liberal vs conservative) for classifying parents as having a probable case of major depression (MD). The liberal scoring requires the respondent report two-week depressive symptoms over at least half the day and includes the first stem question in the MD score, while the conservative one requires symptoms be present most of the day and omits the first stem question when calculating the MD score (BCRCW, 2018, p.41-p.43).
