Ethics

- Professional certification available
- Informs hospital policies and care practices
- Articulates underlying ethical values or principles justifying the ethical acceptable range of options for care
- Mitigates values conflicts
- Provides education to staff about ethical principles underlying care
- Provides an institutional check on high profile or high risk processes, e.g., neuro-criteria death scenarios, requests for prognostic nondisclosure
- Can be requested independently by any impacted member: families, clinicians, patients, hospital administrators

Consult-based model
Interprofessional team
Complex family meetings
Patient/family and staff support
Attends to moral distress
Early integration improves outcomes
Shared decision making
Elicits patient/family values related to care decisions
Facilitates clear and open

communication between patients and clinicians

•Helps identify appropriate surrogate decision makers for patients without decision-making capacity

Palliative

- Board-Licensure and Accreditation options
- Elicits patient/family understanding of their clinical course and prognosis
- Complex symptom management
- Quality of life
- End-of-life care
- Continuity in care
- Usually consulted by clinical teams caring for a patient
