Accepting an alpha risk of 0.05 and a beta risk of 0.2 in a two-sided test, 9775 subjects are necessary in first group and 9775 in the second to find as statistically significant a proportion difference, expected to be of 0.54 in group 1 and 0.52 in group 2. It has been anticipated a drop-out rate of 0%. The ARCSINUS approximation was used. We calculated the sample size for academic reasons but used data from all invited women, which exceeded the sample size estimated with the GRANMO calculator.
