\* The focus of TIDieR is on reporting details of the intervention elements (and where relevant, comparison elements) of a study. Other elements and methodological features of studies are covered by other reporting statements and checklists and have not been duplicated as part of the TIDieR checklist. When a randomised trial is being reported, the TIDieR checklist should be used in conjunction with the CONSORT statement (see www.consort-statement.org) as an extension of Item 5 of the CONSORT 2010 Statement. When a clinical trial protocol is being reported, the TIDieR checklist should be used in conjunction with the SPIRIT 2013 TIDieR checklist

**Statement** (see <u>www.spirit-statement.org</u>). For alternate study designs, TIDieR can be used in conjunction with the appropriate checklist for that study design (see <u>www.equator-network.org</u>).
